


Marlow Farmer's Market

The Marlow farmer's market, which started in June runs every Sunday from 10am-2pm in Dean Street car park. There is a wide range of produce on offer every week including locally produced meats, freshly baked bread, plants, seasonal fruit and vegetables, cakes, pies, and free range eggs.

Food miles are kept to a minimum with as many local producers as possible:

Bruce Garside produces hams, bacon, sausages and pork pies from his traditional Berkshire pigs reared in the Hambleden Valley and has a stall at the farmers market every fortnight.

Boarstall Meats from Brill, near Thame attend every week, with a wide selection of free range chicken, beef, pork and lamb cuts.

Seasonal fruit and vegetables such as carrots, cabbages, swedes and beetroot are available from the Old Farm shop based near Didcot.

There is always a good offering of competitively priced perennial, annuals and herbaceous plants and shrubs from Ray Wingroves nursery at Knowl Hill.

David & Gill Emmett from Rockwell End, located between Frieth & Hambleden started the market and attend every week with their free range eggs, unique range of traditional & speciality potatoes and seasonal vegetables.

Many people already enjoy the experience of attending the farmer's market but more importantly tasting the superior flavour of food available- why not try it for yourself - we hope to see you there.



Don't be a Victim of the Festive Thief

'Tis the Season to be jolly', or so the song goes.

But with Christmas fast approaching it is also the season to guard against becoming a victim of a festive thief. Over Christmas, criminals take advantage of the extra shopping we all do, the hustle and bustle of the town center and the value of the goods we buy as presents to line their pockets with ill-gotten gains. But, by following a few common sense steps, you can make sure you have a jolly Christmas time:

Out shopping:

During busy shopping times make sure you stay alert for pickpockets and be extra careful with your wallet or purse. Have your wallet/purse close to your body and don't carry too much money.

If you travel by car, make sure you park in a well-lit area, lock all doors and windows and do not leave presents on view.

Try not to return to your car to leave purchases in the boot before continuing with your shopping as thieves sometimes watch car parks for such a chance.

At home:

Having bought lots of lovely presents, don't make it easy for someone to steal from your house. Keep presents out of sight. If you 'hide' or store larger items such as bicycles in a garden shed or outbuildings then make sure they are secure. Check what items you already have (such as TV, DVD player etc.) and what extra items you are getting for Christmas. It may be that you need to check your insurance to make sure you are covered for the full value of the goods in your home.

If you go out for the evening or return home after dark, make sure it looks like there is someone at home by turning on the lights or using a timer switch. Don't leave curtains open and be extra careful about locking windows and doors. Finally as a fire precaution, don't leave Christmas lights on in the house when you are out.

Our Local Foods and Farming

Autumn 2009, in particular October, will be remembered as a pleasant dry and easy month - just right for the arable farms where work on ploughing, cultivations and seeding ready for Harvest 2010 took place in ideal conditions. Ploughing and cultivations started straight after the combine harvester had finished each field.

The preparation of seedbeds on the farms is the same in objective, but different in scale, to work in a vegetable garden. Germination of the new seeds will be disappointing if there are hard clods of earth with cavities in between. On some farms with heavy clay soils the land was ploughed to bury the stubble and trash and then not worked for two or three weeks. On those clay soils some of the clods dried out to become as hard as bricks, and nearly the same size as a half brick, whereas if the ploughed land had been worked with disc harrows or cultivator before it became too dry then a fine and friable seedbed could have been achieved.


Some farms use 'minimal cultivations', where the first implement on the stubble will loosen and stir the soil rather than turning it over. This can only be successful if the stubble is clean and free of weeds, which could subsequently re-grow and choke the next crop.

At Kensham farm we use the plough on some fields and minimal cultivations on others, depending on the soil type and how clean the stubbles are after harvest. But with both methods we try to make the seedbed fine and firm to discourage the movement of slugs, and to make it soon after harvest to give the weed seeds time to chit and start growing. The very young weed plants can then be killed out with a herbicide spray such as Roundup before seeding the wheat or barley in September or October, ready to be harvested during the next August.

On the political side of farming and food production we farmers are pleased that Defra, the Department for the Environment, Food and Rural Affairs which is responsible to the EU in Brussels for administration of the many regulations affecting British farms, has recently published statistics on food supplies. These statistics show that fifteen years ago we grew 77% of the fresh vegetables that were consumed in Britain, whereas now we only grow 50%, and the proportion of indigenous foods, that is foods which can be grown in the British climate, has dropped from 82% down to 73%.

This comes as no surprise to us farmers, since politicians of both major political parties for the past twenty or more years have favoured imports of cheap food from overseas countries with lower quality standards than our own. However it is really good that Government is now recognizing the importance of food security, and we hope that Defra's future policies will encourage British farms to grow more of our own foods.

Moorend Common Update

South Meadow

The clearance work to stop sallow tree encroachment on South Meadow has been continuing apace. At the time of writing, the first week of work is over and it's looking great.

Our tree surgeons have vast experience of working in woodlands and are able to identify which trees are of the highest intrinsic value and should be retained and which can be cleared to allow the meadow to flourish.

You may be wondering why some log lengths are standing vertically? They're not stumps that have been forgotten, nor have our contractors been indulging in a little out-of-hours sculpture – our naturalist advisers asked for them to be left that way to ensure the moths that hole up there for the winter can climb out again in spring.

Even if you're not a particular moth fan – although some of them are really beautiful – they're a valuable part of the ecosystem, pollinating the plants and providing food for birds, bats and hedgehogs etc.

The log piles along the tree line on South Meadow have been left as wildlife habitats. Dead and dying trees provide excellent and essential homes for insects and mammals.



Volunteer Days on Folly Meadow

The Wycombe Rangers did a great job with their team of volunteers on 12 November. The rain held off long enough for them to clear a huge patch of encroaching snowberry and take their chain saws to an out-of-control blackthorn thicket on the verge by Folly Meadow.

This verge used to be tended and mown, but has been neglected for several years allowing the scrub to grow so high that it is overshadowing gardens and becoming entangled in overhead lines. These particular trees will have to be tackled by the appropriate power companies for safety reasons.

The big clear up at the weekend was hampered on the Saturday by torrential rain and winds, so a huge thank you to those volunteers who turned up. We got soaked to the skin and prickled like pincushions by brambles and blackthorn, but at the same time it was hugely satisfying to get stuck in.

Sunday dawned bright and clear for the clear-up bonfire and our youngest helpers were rewarded with a safe ringside seat.



With the scrub cut back and a professional 'flail' to break up the roots and tussocks, grasses and wildflowers will be encouraged back so that this area of the Common becomes part of Folly Meadow once more.

Bridleway

By the time of printing, the new bridleway across Moorend Common will be complete. The previous bridleway route was too deep in mud to be usable for much of the year and the new path will enable more riders to enjoy the Common.



The new route links up two existing tracks with a new stretch of path through a copse of trees. The route follows the track opposite the Prince Albert pub up the hill, into the wood, and joins up with another track at the top edge of North Meadow.

Riders can then turn left to join the bridleway past Muzwell farm and up through Finings Wood, or emerge onto Church Road at Colliers Corner. (Contact me for a more detailed description if you're interested).

The route will be over-signed to begin with so that people are aware of the route of the bridleway and the different route of the public footpath if they're not keen on meeting horses or cyclists. These will be removed in due course.

Lane End Conservation Group

At the recent AGM photographs showing the activities of our volunteers gave a good impression of work done on Action Days. The main tasks in and around the village are the ponds and their surrounding areas: Mill Pond along the High Street, Foundry Pond (by the bus stop), which was restored in recent years and Botany Brook beyond the car park hedge; each requiring at least two Action Days work. We are very grateful to the Lane End Parish Council for having taken on the grass cutting on the green by Foundry Pond, where due to lack of machinery LECG volunteers could only strim the grass occasionally.

The well-walked Four-Fields footpath, almost one mile long, also requires at least two Action Day's work each year. It soon becomes impassable when the hedge and shrubs start growing in the spring. There are also the almost 40 miles of public footpaths in the parish and some permissible ones, that LECG helpers clear, when required.

The Harris Garden at the cross roads in the center of the village is tenderly taken care of by our oldest volunteer and sometimes alone, sometimes with other helpers.

If more residents of the parish would be interested in giving a hand once a month, much more could be done to enhance the local environment. As it is, we can only spend a couple of Action Days on Cadmore End Common with its beautiful natural woodland ponds and the surrounding areas teeming with wildlife.

Please give some thought to setting aside an hour or two a month to help with the tasks of keeping the green and open spaces of Lane End as a pleasant environment for all to enjoy. Visit our website to learn more:

Christmas Spiced Cookies

Just a little seasonal taster.....

Makes Six Dozen Cookies

Ingredients

3/4 cup sugar

2/3 cup butter or margarine, softened

 \mathcal{E}

1/4 cup orange juice

1/2 cup dark corn syrup

1/2 cup dark molasses

4-1/2 cups plain flour 3/4 cup whole wheat flour

2 tsp. ground ginger

1 tsp. baking soda

1 tsp. salt

1/2 tsp. ground cloves

1/2 tsp. ground nutmeg

1/2 tsp. ground allspice

Method

In a mixing bowl, cream sugar and butter.

Blend in orange juice, corn syrup and molasses.

Combine flours, ginger, baking soda, salt, cloves, nutmeg and allspice. Add to creamed mixture; mix well. Chill 3-4 hours or overnight. Roll a portion of the dough on a lightly floured surface to 1/4-inch thickness. Cut into desired shapes. Place 2 inches apart on greased baking sheets.


Repeat with remaining dough. Bake at 350°F for 12-14 minutes.






