From the Editor

I love autumn - the crisp mornings, the mellow yellow sunlight and turning leaves. But not in summer! What happened to August? Oh well, fingers crossed for a blazing September.

The proposal for a new stadium development at Wycombe Air Park has really got villagers talking. Wycombe District Council is holding its cards close at this early stage in the game and hard facts are difficult to establish, although rumours abound. (See p12 for a précis of the word on the street). Personally, I think a new state-of-the-art sporting village could be great for the town as a whole, but if the development is at Wycombe Air Park and is as extensive as is rumoured, then it could be disastrous for the character of Lane End and surrounding countryside.

I realise, of course, that this is stereotypical NIMBYism, but I do think there's a bigger principle at stake in this case. Lane End lies in an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONB). Overturning Green Belt designation as soon as a likely-looking development proposal comes along makes a mockery of the whole system. Read the summary on p12, read the public consultation documents and most importantly, tell people your views—Wycombe District Council, The Clarion, the Parish Clerk. We all need to know what you think.

Parish Council website

On the subject of LEPC's website, you'll have seen on the flyer on the front of the magazine that we have a new, revamped, revitalised website for the village. It's kept up to date with all the latest news from the parish council, including matters discussed at the latest PC meeting, planning updates and all kinds of local issues. Fill out the online questionnaire before 30 September 2010 and you'll be in with a chance of winning £250 in time for Christmas!

New councillors

LEPC welcomes two new parishioners to the parish council: Lorraine Smith from Wheeler End and David Crichton from Cadmore End. These co-options bring LEPC to its full complement of councillors.

Street Lighting

LEPC is to install three new street lights along Church Road. The first will be sited just after the conference centre and the other two will be approximately 20 paces apart. Currently, the limited street lighting is a problem for people using that stretch of road in the dark. LEPC has been working on the best places to install the new lights and work will commence in the near future.

New allotment water supply

The Bunkers allotment site on Church Road will soon have access to an exclusive water supply thanks to LEPC. Thames Water will be installing the supply shortly.

Traffic surveys

Lane End Parish Council is undertaking traffic surveys at several points within the village. The surveys will take place in September and October of this year.

The former Elga Site

Ashill Developments is pleased to confirm that it has exchanged contracts on the purchase of the old Veolia/Elga Water site at Springbank House, Marlow Road.

The site has been empty for a number of years and has failed to attract any commercial purchaser to continue the employment use on the site. For that reason, Wycombe District Council are proposing to allocate the site for a residentially-led, mixeduse development (ie. residential plus retail, industrial and office.)

Ashill is currently looking at ideas for a scheme to redevelop the site and will be keen to include the local community in progressing their plans. They will be communicating

with local residents in due course to let them know more details.

Given the high levels of hazardous materials on site and within the building fabric (including asbestos and toxic acids) as soon as the sale completes at the end of August, Ashill will be making the site secure. It is also taking advice on whether to remove structures that pose most risk sooner rather than later.

Development threat at Wycombe Air Park?

What the Officials say

- The Adams Park Stadium at Sands cannot provide the facilities required by Wycombe Wanderers and London Wasps, ie. increased capacity, better corporate and player facilities, media centres, better access and a 'better experience'.
- Doing nothing is not an option because the clubs are losing money without the surrounding commercial activities modern clubs require and there is no room for expansion at Adams Park.
- Wycombe District Council, in partnership with the clubs are looking at options for creating a new stadium in a different location which would include many additional professional, commercial and community facilities.
- This 'Sports Village' could potentially include cricket training facilities, badminton and squash courts, hockey pitches, track and field and cycling facilities along with commercial 'leisure and lifestyle' facilities.
- The benefits to the community include keeping the Clubs in Wycombe, as they create jobs and bring revenue into the district. Also,

the opportunity to get more people into sport and provide an additional leisure destination for the area.

- No site has yet been earmarked there are 18 other sites on the list.
- stadium development (costing circa £50 million) have yet to be agreed. Cross-financing is a likely option—ie. selling land with development potential and using that money to fund the main development.
- A Core Strategy Planning Review is currently being undertaken. le. considering whether to change current planning policy to allow such large scale development to occur.

What the Locals say

I must here make clear that whilst the information is from trusted sources, some of the following is conjecture and opinion and readers should ask questions of Wycombe District Council (WDC) so that they can confirm or refute any claims.

For

Congestion relief in Sands—A
new stadium at Booker Air Park
would relieve the congestion at
Adams Park and the training pitch is
already adjacent.

- New M40 link—A new link off the M40 would make accessibility for Away supporters that much easier as they wouldn't have to enter town.
- **Jobs creation**—The new retail and leisure outlets would create new jobs in the area.
- Aircraft noise reduction—The airfield would go, or at least be reduced in size and the nuisance of aircraft noise in the area would be reduced or removed altogether.

New facilities—
 There is a shortage of hotels in the area.

of hotels in the area. A new hotel would also help relieve traffic in the town centre.

Against

- Loss of the Airfield—Wycombe Air Park is likely to be the preferred site as studies have already been commissioned into its use. According to the Bucks Free Press, airfield operators are being threatened with a 1600% rent increase by WDC, effectively pricing the airfield out of business. However, WDC has since said to The Clarion: 'preliminary investigations suggest that you could retain a modified Air Park alongside a Stadium and associated development (at Wycombe Air Park).'
- Loss of Green Belt—The Core Strategy Planning Review is another way of saying that they want to take away the Green Belt designation in the Booker-Lane End area in order

to increase the value of the land. (Currently worth £4-5k per acre as farmland, potentially up to £1m if it becomes land with planning permission for development.) This means that the land can be sold to a developer to pay for the stadium. 'What is the point,' says one local, 'in having

a Core Strategy designating Green Belt land and Area Of Outstanding Natural Beauty if a Civil Servant can just come along and 'rubber stamp' it away?'

- **Development sprawl**—The perimeter of the Air

Park extends down to the spinney at the bottom of Piccadilly Bends. The Stadium development—or any housing development that may come about through the cross-financing agreement—would potentially extend this far, thus paving the way for Lane End to essentially become part of the urban sprawl of Cressex through Booker, taking away its rural aspect.

- Effect on house prices—If this happens it is likely to have a detrimental effect on house prices. Estate agents currently describe Lane End as a 'pleasant, semi-rural village'. 'Lane End, suburb of High Wycombe' will not have quite the same effect in the 'for sale' details.
- *Traffic* Traffic through Cadmore, Bolter and Lane End is already too heavy and too fast. A major development at Booker will only see traffic increase—and not only on match

days. The Sports Village is billed as a 24/7 facility. Or will there be a new road link off the M40 cutting a swathe across our countryside? A source says the Highways Agency has ruled this out, but there is no certainty.

- *Parking*—Supporters are willing to park a long way from the stadium to avoid parking charges. Would the B482 and Lane End become a giant car park for the new stadium? The alternative is double yellow lines from Booker to Bolter End. Lane End is already short of parking—how would these extra restrictions affect local businesses?
- *Light Pollution*—Floodlighting for a stadium will have to be around 100ft high. Canopy lighting (containing light spill) is a possibility for the stadium itself, but what about for the car park?

Wycombe Air Park is set very high up. 'There'll be no need for streetlighting as far as Frieth and Spurgrove,' suggests one local.

- **Detriment to existing facilities** The district already has 1008 acres of outdoor sports facilities available, many struggling for funds. Siting the new proposed pitches and facilities in one place would likely be to the detriment of existing facilities.
- Cost to the Tax Payer-

Wycombe Wanderers and Wasps are owned by the same company—which is already heavily in debt. Wycombe Wanderers pulls in 6000 spectators on a good day. A new stadium will cost upwards of £50million. Will it be a huge white elephant and will we as ratepayers be shouldering that debt?

A decade of twinning – what next?

Many people from within our community contributed to the great success of the Tenth Anniversary Celebrations held in June. 



rushes don't drive out the more delicate wild flowers and grasses.



We've a new orchid to add the growing list of plants on Moorend Common. It's a broad-leaved Helleborine and very pretty to look at. (photo: Alan Gudge)

We have also had lots of but-

terflies on the Common this summer - small Copper butterflies on the Fleabane which has been flowering in concentrated patches on South Meadow. There are also lots of Common Blues which could be a result of the Birdsfoot Trefoil which is thriving in lots of locations.

Our recent bat survey went very well. We picked our way around the Common at dusk with experts from Wycombe District Council and the North Bucks Bat Group who let us borrow their bat detectors. These little hand-held devices pick up the echo-location calls of the bats. We recorded lots of pipistrelles but are just waiting for the recording analysis to see whether there were any other, rarer species.

The volunteer wardens held a summer bug hunt on Moorend Common in conjunction with Lane End Village Pre-school. Lots of people attended, the rain held off and much fun was had searching for minibeasts and chasing butterflies. Thanks to Dorothy Harman.

We are still pursuing the Sustainable Communities Act submission but we need to put pressure on our MPs to do something for us. If you should feel motivated to keep the interest in our cause (to reduce the noise and environmental pollution from the M40) going, please write to your MP. Here are some pointers:

A good letter:

Is courteous. Has a few simple action requests. Is 1-1½ pages at most and says who you are, why you are writing **now**, and what you want done. For example:

Dear Mr MP

What do you want to tell him about, eg noise, fumes, diverted traffic?

Who are you – where do you live, for how long, how close to the M40?

What is it that is annoying you?

Tell him you support the M40 CEG's initiative. Ask him to press for a successful outcome.

Tell him what you want him to do. eg promote reduced speeds, stop HGVs at night, replace noise barriers or your own favoured idea.

Crime Information

Compared to the same period last year, burglaries are down from an average of 10.7 to 5.7 (46.9% decrease), robberies have increased from 0.3 to 0.7 (100%), vehicle crime is up from 7 to 10 (42.9%), violent crime has increased from 8 to 12.3 (54.2%) and anti-social behaviour has decreased from 44.7 to 28.7 (35.8% decrease).

Anti-Social Behaviour

The team has really noticed a drop in anti social behaviour in the area with incidents down 35.8%. In particular, Stokenchurch has seen a big decrease in reported incidents. On 19-21 July, the team completed Operation Grievance. This involved 4-5 officers each evening on hi-visibility foot patrols in Stokenchurch targeting the hot spot areas where antisocial behaviour has previously been an issue. The operation was a success and previous victims of antisocial behaviour were visited and confirmed to officers that things had improved for them considerably.

Offenders brought to justice

Two adults from Lane End will soon be in court for fly tipping.

A local man has been charged with ABH for an offence committed in

Church Road, Lane End on 25 Dec.

A Lane End man has been charged with drink-driving in Lane End.

A 16 year old male from Lane End was arrested and admitted stealing car badges from vehicles parked around the village. He has been reprimanded.

Speeding and Parking

The team has been finding out what issues you would like us to target. Drink-driving, drugs, dog fouling and littering, have all been raised, but speeding through the local villages appears to be a priority.

A number of road safety days have taken place in the last couple of months. Extra officers have been on patrol to target speeding motorists and persons using their mobile phones whilst driving. Many vehicles have been stopped and tickets issued to offending drivers.

- 1) Check your bike. First & foremost ensure your bike is in good, safe working order. Take it in to your local bike shop for a service, although at this time of year you may need to book in advance.
- 2) Learn how to fix a puncture. Ask the mechanic at the bike shop to show you how to change the inner tube and advise you on any spares you may need to ensure you can at least get home if you get a flat.
- 3) Take a phone.
- 4) Take water. Especially in the

- heat it is very important you keep well hydrated. Carry water in a bottle kept in a 'cage' on the bike frame or in a backpack containing a water bladder. Take snacks too – bananas and energy bars are good.
- **5) Be realistic.** If you've not been on the bike for sometime don't try to tackle a hundred mile ride straight away! Build up slowly.

6) Wear suitable clothing.

Farms hit by midges and drought

During the long hot early Summer of 2010 we have been troubled by two particular insect pests on our wheat crops, both of which live in cocoons in the soil from year to year, and then only become trouble-some when soil temperatures warm up in May to mid June.

Vegetable gardeners always look out for aphids on their rows of broad beans, and similarly cereal farmers always look out for the Orange Blossom Midge which emerges when soil temperatures reach about 13°c. The midges lav their eggs on the floret of the wheat ear as it is forming, and the eggs soon hatch into larvae which spoil both the quality and the yield of the grain. The remedy is to spray the young wheat crop in May with an insecticide which will kill the flying midges, or with a stronger insecticide which will also be effective against the young larvae feeding on the wheat.

This Summer many wheat crops have also been affected by the most unusual Saddle Gall Midge. This has a similar life cycle to the orange blossom midge, but the midge does

not hatch out until soil temperatures have reached 18°c. The flying midge then lavs its eggs on the leaf sheath of the growing wheat plant, which hatch into bright red or orange grubs about 5 mm in length. These small grubs then move down the leaf and damage the stem of the cereal plant. This is the first year we have been troubled by the saddle gall midge, since it is generally only a problem in warmer climates, and by the time we spotted them it was too late to take any protective action. After harvest we will know how much yields have been depressed by the saddle gall midge.

By early July the poor growth on pasture fields caused by lack of summer rainfall had become a serious matter for livestock farms, to the extent that some farmers were having to supplement the grass grazed by their cattle with hay or silage reserved for the coming winter.

A side effect of this lack of rainfall for us was that the pond on Cadmore End Common in front of Kensham Farm totally dried out for the first time since 1975. By the end of July there was so little water in the

pond that we had to provide water in a pan for the newly hatched moorhen chicks. We walked over the edges of the pond and found that there was of depth of more than two feet of soft dried out silt above the original hard clay bottom of the pond. This pond is not fed by any spring but instead it collects surface

water from several acres of fields as well as from the gutters, yards and roadway around the farm buildings, so the deeper the better for collecting water in a wet period and hopefully it will retain water

when evaporation takes place in a long dry summer.

So we decided to act immediately, before the next rainstorm refilled the pond. We cleared out the soft silt using the large fork lift to scoop out the silt, together with the goat willow bushes growing in it. This was then loaded onto grain trailers and tipped onto a heap for spreading on the fields at a later stage. We moved about 350 tonnes of silt and bushes within two days, and then tidied up and re-seeded the pond verges where the farm machinery had left tracks.

Pond cleaning is just one of the many conservation tasks that we try to fit in with the farm's real work of growing wheat for bread making. Government and EU policy in recent years have been encouraging con-

servation work with grants towards the cost of the work, but in the case of cleaning the Kensham pond it seemed more sensible to carry out the work straightaway while weather conditions were right, rather than to spend months on form-filling.

The recent good news on the

political front is that our Coalition Government recognises the importance of an adequate supply of food for the people of Britain. For the past twenty years Government policy favoured importing food

from overseas if it was cheaper, and failed to recognise that if there was ever to be a worldwide shortage of food, then the countries abroad would stop exporting their food to us in preference to letting their own people go hungry. But now we have a Government that realises the importance of food production from British farms.

Bryan and Alison Edgley moved to the 102-acre Kensham Farm in 1955. Since then the land farmed has grown to around 2,300 acres on which Bryan still manages the diversified enterprises of craft and light industrial workshops, let cottages and flats. There are also DIY livery, private riding trails and manege facilities for horse owners. Their son, Charlie Edgley manages the farming side of the Partnership in which the main crop is wheat.



ough, John Hampden and Claires Court and hope they come back to visit us.



Gardening

with Dave Dunbar



It's been a warm dry summer, and the ground is baked and hard to work. Even after a heavy downfall the water hardly penetrates. Still, now should be a time for sitting back, relaxing, and enjoying the fruits of all that labour done in spring, except maybe for a little mowing, weeding, feeding, pruning, dead-heading, staking, edging...

Seasonal Top Tips:

So how's the grass looking... parched? Once we get back to our usual British weather the rain will soon green it up again. However, if you absolutely must water (with stored water preferably) a good soaking is better than a sprinkle or the roots will have no need to grow deeper if all the water is sitting on the top. If you don't cut it too short it will reduce drought stress, and cutting off little and often is best.

Many of your spring flowering shrubs are preparing to make flower buds for next year, like camellias and rhododendrons etc, so a good water would help preparation.

Favourites:

Some late flowering perennials that are probably just finishing now but give a good few weeks of colour are



Phlox, which come in a variety of colours, (shown here) and Agapanthus, with large

rounded heads of most commonly blue flowers, although can be bought in white.

For a late summer show with prolonged flowering, often referred to as Black Eyed Susan, but Rud-



beckia fulgida "Deamii" is a real orange beauty, about 2-3ft tall in flower, likes a sunny border but I know one doing well in semi-shade.

Dave's Mystery Plant:

I can reach 30ft or more, and have nice big shiny green leaves that I hold onto all year round. Most of my relatives are spring-flowering and deciduous, but what really makes me proud is my large fragrant white cup shape blooms, which come out intermittently through Summer to Autumn. What's my name?

Ask the: plumber

Question Why are my pipe joints leaking?

This is a common question and it specifically relates to compression joints - the ones with nuts at the end. It's usually radiators that leak from the base of the valve or stopcocks that leak from the pipe joint. The reason for the leaks is movement. With radiator pipes it's usually because they're being knocked by vacuum cleaners and the nut at the base of the valve eventually works loose because of the tiny movements in the pipe and nut. With stopcocks, it's often too many things being crammed into cupboards under sinks that push on to the pipework at the back of the cupboard every time the door closes. The stopcock nut works loose or the movement eventually wears a hole in the pipe.

Most of these leaks can be cured by re-tightening the nut but damaged pipework will need replacing. Watch what you're doing with the vacuum cleaner and don't keep cramming stuff into your under-sink cupboard and you'll save yourself a lot of hassle from leaking joints.

Milk Men

Make hay while the sun shines!

As I sit down to write this article the farms around Lane End are all busy harvesting their crops whilst the sun shines. At Bolter End we grow wheat and barley. The grain goes to making flour and animal feeds, but also we bale up the straw so we can use it as bedding for cows during the winter. I could go

on to tell you more about corn crops, but Mr Edgley has far greater expertise on the subject so I will leave that to him!

As well as harvesting

crops for human consumption we have been busy preparing and storing winter feed for the cows. As the grass slows down and then stops growing in the autumn we have to have enough forage stored up to feed the cows over the winter, so we spend the summer making hay (dried grass) clamp silage (chopped grass that is kept succulent by storing in an air tight clamp)

and baled silage (like clamp silage but in 500kg wrapped 'balls' for ease of transportation) to be sure we have enough to last for even the longest winter.

The cows we raise and milk are Guernseys, a breed that originates from Guernsey island. They are of

medium size, golden brown colour and are very docile and friendly to work with. All the feeds we make are carefully designed to be just what our Guernsey's want and need to eat, so they get the right nourishment and

they get t nourishm they really enjoy eating it!

We got our first Guernsey at Bolter End when my Great Grandfather bought a few cows from Reading Market in 1936, and the cows we are milking now are direct descendents of these cows. This is possible as we breed our own replacements, meaning when one of our milking cows has a calf, it will be



either a Guernsey heifer (girl) or a bull calf. All the heifers are reared up so that when they are big enough they can calve themselves, start milk production and join the rest of the herd. This system is continuous so that we hopefully have a steady number of cows in the herd at all times.

Through not buying cows in we have a 'closed herd' which has numerous benefits. Not bringing in cows from different farms reduces the risks of introducing new health problems so we have strong healthy cows. Also, by rearing every animal from birth we know everything there is to know about each animal which helps to make decisions like breeding and feeding that bit easier.

Breeding cows is a special art in itself. We want a cow to have a calf

that will be good for her, i.e. not too big so that it may be a difficult birth, but also we want a calf that will be of greatest potential for us.

Through the breeding choices that we have made over the past 70 vears we have bred some fantastic cows and this is recognised by the English Guernsey Cattle Society as we have some of the top ranked cows in the country. Last year we had the First. Fourth and Fifth best Guernsev bull calves born in the UK! Our bulls have also been selected for Artificial Insemination This is when semen is taken from a bull and frozen so that it can be taken anywhere in the world. Our bulls, born and raised in Lane End. are now having calves as far off as Australia and New Zealand
