What is your Parish Council responsible for?

Street Lights—The Parish Council owns 230 street lights, we pay for the lighting, maintenance and repairs. There are more than 230 lights around the village, the rest are owned by Bucks County Council.

If you see any lights that appear to be faulty or aren't working please do not hesitate to contact me, Hayley Glasgow, the parish clerk, on 01494 437111. Most street lights will have a number on, quote this number and I will arrange for an engineer to take a look at the problem.

Allotments—Lane End Parish
Council is responsible for three
allotment sites: The Bunkers on
Church Road, Chalky Fields off
Marlow Road and Sandy Fields at
Cadmore End. The allotment
holders take pride in their allotments
and grow some amazing produce.
The Parish Council has a waiting list
for allotments as they are very
popular but if you would like more
information or would like to be
added to the waiting list please do
not hesitate to contact me.

Bus shelters—the Parish Council owns six bus shelters around the village. Every time a shelter is vandalised, money from your precept (the portion of your council tax which goes to the parish council) has to go towards correcting the damage.

Land—The parish council is also responsible for maintaining and preserving lots of land around the

village. This includes large tracts of land such as Moorend Common and the recently acquired Ditchfield Common (see p36). The Parish Council invests money into conservation to preserve these valuable natural habitats and make sure everyone can enjoy our beautiful natural places.

We also own smaller parcels of land around the village, such as the village green and even some grass verges. With all this land comes the

expense of grass cutting. We contract the job out to a grass cutter who maintains the grassy areas throughout the year. We also contract a woodlands maintenance team to ensure trees and hedges are kept to a reasonable size.

Of course, the parish council doesn't own all the land in Lane End, some is owned by Wycombe District Council (WDC) and some by the Dashwood Estate, but if you notice a problem please contact me and if I can't help. I'll find out who can!

Latest news

Residents of Cadmore End will be pleased to hear they will soon have a Parish Council notice board, so there is now no excuse not to pop along to a Parish Council meeting.

WDC has refused the Planning ap-

plication to develop Springbank House (former Elga Site), information can be found on the planning section of the WDC website. Ashill Developments will look to re-submit an application.

My goodness, how the undergrowth has grown this summer! No sooner have the footpaths been cleared than a mere two weeks later the brambles and nettles are rampant once more. However there is a plus side because the fruit and nuts will be in abundant supply.

There are two matters which concern me greatly:



- 1. Small motorbikes are being ridden in Widdenton Park Woods and the tyre marks are making the paths very muddy and rutted. Not only are the bikes a danger to children and walkers but they are illegal on all footpaths and bridleways. Be warned the police have been notified of this problem. Please DO NOT ride your bikes illegally in our woodland.
- 2. There are several footpaths on Cadmore End Common which are being used by riders on horseback. Once again this is illegal riders must stick to bridleways. The problem is particularly bad on 'LE42', the path running beside Head and Body

Pond towards Bolter End Lane. This is a 'damp' path at the best of times and during wet weather is extremely muddy and almost impassable due to the imprints of horse's hooves. Once again, please adhere to the rules of the countryside.


Cricket

Lane End 1: Stadium 0

You'll probably all have heard by now—the stadium plans at Booker have been 'kicked into touch'.

At a Wycombe District Council meeting on Monday 18 July, councillors spoke for and against the stadium proposals, then the Leader of the Cabinet, Alex Collingwood, said in order to build the stadium: 'WDC would have to provide £31m with the public having to make up the £10m shortfall... Hand on heart I don't think we can afford it... and I don't think it meets the special circumstances for building on the Green Belt.'

It came down to a vote (anvone who had expressed an opinion against the stadium was excluded) but still the vote was unanimous to scrap the stadium plans. WDC came good in the end.

GASP (Groups Against the Stadium Proposals) was instrumental in pointing out the shortcomings of the scheme by analysing the business and traffic plans and communicating their findings in a considered way to Councillors, GASP also did a lot of work to raise awareness of the stadium proposals and the effects on

the local community through leafleting events, demonstrations and video sketches posted on Youtube.

In the end, however, it was a community effort and special thanks to Lane End Parish Council and **Booker Commons and Woods** Protection Society who provided GASP's biggest donations, everyone who put their hand in the pocket, everyone who delivered leaflets, came to the demonstrations and generally supported the cause— we did it together, the com-

To build on the success of last year's event, we are going bigger and better this year and instead of offering one venue for one afternoon, we are going to spread the event over:



Debbie Williams, knew Lane End Primary was the school for her when she was introduced to the school by a group of Year 6 children. 'Children speak volumes,' she says. 'There was a great welcome when I walked through the door and the children were happy to show me around, speaking confidently and proudly about the school.'

Lane End Primary is certainly a pleasant space to be in. There's a light, airy feel as flower-filled court-yards punctuate the building. It feels friendly and busy in a happy, bustling way when I visit after school. Debbie leads me to her office, which is ordered and calm, like the lady herself, but there's the hint of a lighter side with a signed picture of the Stereophonics on the bookcase.

The thing that most strikes me about Debbie, however, is her determination. She's someone who

knows what she wants and will do all she can to get there.

From Essex originally, Debbie began her career in Aylesbury, working at a first school with children from very mixed—I get the impression it's a euphemism for

'difficult'— home lives. It was there that, 'I learnt my craft,' she says, 'I realised that unless you understood the children, you couldn't take the teaching any further'

She then became an Advanced Skills teacher, meaning that she was able to prove that she had been able to raise standards over a period of time.

This meant she was able to go into other schools and support them with their literacy and ICT and got to see how other schools worked.

Her first leadership role was as Deputy Head at Burford school in Marlow Bottom. 'It is a large, busy school in a leafy area of South Bucks, so a different context than I had been used to,' she says.

It was there that she began studying for the Headship exams. They normally take a year, but she fasttracked through it when she discovered she was pregnant with her son. Back to work after maternity leave, she then began looking for a role as Headteacher.

Debbie came into the job at Lane End Primary with her eyes wide open. 'You do your research,' she says, 'As much as you want to be a Head, it's got to be the right school


> for you and one that you know that you can lead well and put your mark on.'

'Having worked in so many different schools I knew what type I suited best. You've got to know that it's a school that you can do something with and help improve.'

It's been a busy first term learning how things run

and getting to know the people. However, Debbie has already started work on new initiatives such as the family forum where issues such as homework and behaviour are reviewed and families can have an input. For September there are already plans in place for specialist music tuition, a new school choir and hot dinners.

'It's not an easy job being a headteacher, but it's the challenge of it that I enjoy,' she says. 'I'm very lucky to have a job where I can come in and look forward to the day and then look back and feel I have achieved something.'

Lizzie falls foul of the Chinese Lantern trend

I am pleased to report that we now have all the grass silage for winter feed cut and clamped. As predicted the first cut of grass taken in May was lower in yield than a normal year due to the dry March

and April, but as soon as it was cut we fertilised again and then when the rain came it grew well so we got very pleasing result from the second cut to make up the difference. All this grass is stored in one air tight clamp in the yard so it can be fed to the cows throughout the winter when the cows are housed indoors.

We have also done all our hay making and bale silage, the late 'spring rain' improved grass yields so we got fairly good results from these harvests as well. We've been harvesting the barley and wheat in July and August, and the

maize will be the last to ripen at the end of September.

We are also at a busy time on the farm for competitions. The local agricultural association; Royal South

Bucks, annually hosts a ploughing match every October along with a range of farming activities.

Last year was an amazing year for Laceys Farm, we won: 'Best Stock Farm' for the farm with the best cows of any breeds and age, 'Best Small Farm' for the farm judged to be best in the under 500 acre category, the winner of this goes in

to the 'Kings Cup' to compete for the 'Best Overall Farm' where we were runners up, and we even beat the Queens Herd at Windsor to win the 'Best Dairy Farm' in Royal South Bucks and East Berkshire Agricul-



tural Associations! This was a fantastic achievement and judging for this years competitions is taking place over the summer, so fingers crossed!!

I must add that not only was it a great year for us, but for farming in Lane End generally as Bryan and Charlie Edgley also won numerous awards, including Best Large Farm.

Another competition that Ed and I entered was the Weetabix Straw Sculpture Competition, for the best sculpture made of straw bales.

You may have noticed our entry, The Flower (although it has been called a windmill or a turbine), perched on the top of Roundhill, looking down towards Fingest. We erected this last October for the competition, but it proved such a popular talking point for locals and walkers that we decided to keep it up for longer.

This one will be coming down in the coming weeks as we start to think about what we can do for this years entry. Although we didn't get placed in the competition, we did get sent a big box of Weetabix for entering, which has worked as a good incentive for us to enter again!

Finally I just want to explain the

dangers of Chinese Lanterns to cows. They may look nice but their consequences for cows are far from pretty. Once the lanterns have burnt out, the empty frame falls to the

ground. If the thin metal wire lands in a standing crop it is almost impossible to spot and will pass through a mower and baler and into our cows' feed. The cows will then eat the feed, wire and all.

Once the wire is inside the cow, the wire will work its way into the animals guts where the sharp ends will stab through the stomach walls and possibly into the

cow's heart.

This is a brutal and excruciating start to what is ultimately a slow and painful death. Lizzie, one of my favourite cows ate some of this wire and our vet, Evan David had to perform surgery to try and find the wire before it caused fatal damage. This involved giving the cow an anaesthetic and cutting into her stomach to try and get the wire out.

This was our only option to prevent an otherwise strong and healthy cow die a painful and untimely death. What is even more distressing is that we have already lost three cows because of wires this year. Please think first before using Chinese Lanterns. Chiltern Commons Project

Report by Katy Dunn

The Chilterns Commons Project is launching at the end of this month. An initiative of the Chilterns Conservation Board, supported with Heritage Lottery Funding, the Commons Project is about preserving the natural heritage of our commons and reminding people that they are there to enjoy.

Commons are a much-overlooked part of our natural and cultural heritage. They're incredibly valuable wildlife habitats, brilliant natural playgrounds and contain centuries of local history within them.

They've been at the heart of our communities since the Middle Ages, but these days we take them for granted as a handy green space to walk the dog or more often, ignore them because we don't even know they're there to be used. We've lost that vital connection with common land since we stopped grazing our animals on them and relying on them to supplement our livelihoods.

The Chilterns Commons Project wants to reconnect people with their local commons. The Chilterns Conservation Board has been awarded £400,000 of Heritage Lottery Funding to make this happen.

On one level the Project is simply about people recognising that commons are there for us all to walk and play on and use. On another, it's about getting people more involved in caring for them and studying them. because if we don't take action. we're going to lose these vital habitats for good. Without maintenance. the scrub takes over and we lose the grassland habitat that is so valuable for wild flowers and insects.

We're lucky to have many commons around here: Moorend, Cadmore End. Wheeler, Handleton, etc. and it's important to preserve them and the history contained within them so that they're not lost to future generations.

The Chilterns Commons Project aims to equip people with the resources and skills to study and maintain our commons. There will be different ways to get involved as the Chilterns Commons Project progresses, but in the first instance. just registering your interest will help with getting the project off the ground. ™Moorend Common

North Meadow

We're really pleased with the progress of the copse area cleared in March. We flailed in July to knock back the opportunist brambles and bracken and encourage the wild flowers and grasses to colonise and it's amazing how quickly the grass has come back. It's great to be able to include this area in the annual

All the meadows are mown and the arisings taken away in late summer to mimic the grazing that originally created and maintained the Common. It helps prevent the hardier, coarser

grasses driving out the more delicate flowers and grasses. The regime seems to be working as the Heath-spotted orchids on North Meadow were better than ever this year - at least 5000 - and they are spreading down the hill in areas we've not seen them before.

Middle Meadow

The wood pasture between the main footpath and Middle Meadow was a no-go area as it was so overrun with brambles. The original plan was to try to encourage the grass to continue into that wood pasture area. However, brambles and scrub do provide a good habitat for nest-

ing birds and mammals, so the compromise was to flail a meandering path through the wood pasture. This allows people access to enjoy the lovely dappled light and mature trees in that area, and encourage a grassy avenue through the wood pasture to see if any interesting species colonise.

South Meadow

The Green Gym has been hard at work this summer. The sallows on South Meadow are a constantly

advancing army and the Green Gym has been invaluable in keeping them at bay. I'm constantly amazed at how hard these conservation volunteers work and we're hugely grateful

for how much they achieve.

It was another good year for the Southern Marsh orchids on South Meadow. There are also some Common-Spotted orchids and many hybrids of the two. Moorend has also been full of yellow Common Rattle this year and it's been a beautiful sight with the purple of the orchids set against the backdrop of yellow Buttercups and Rattle.

Lane End Conservation Group Report by Clive Lumbers

After the Lane End Conservation Group was formed in 1983, an early project and the brainchild of group founder Herbert (Nobby) Clark (right), was to locate and restore Blackwell, a keyhole-shaped well circa 1850. It was named after a prominent 19th century village family. Situated next to Foundry Pond and the old iron foundry, it was much used before the provision of mains water and had been lost from view since World War II, having been capped with concrete and covered with turf.



Permission to open-up Blackwell was given by the Dashwood Estate in September 1984; an abortive

attempt to locate the well took place on 1 December and it was finally located on 8 December 1984, only to discover that the public pavement was partially over the site. Work began in 1985 with the use of an excavator to remove the pavement and lift the concrete cover.

The well was finally 'opened' by Sir Francis Dashwood at a public ceremony in 1988.

™Ditchfield Common's future

Lane End Parish Council is taking the ultimate step to secure the future of open green space at the centre of Lane End. The Parish Council has agreed to purchase Ditchfield Common (subject to contract) which came on the market

earlier this year.

Ditchfield

and scrub on
the southwest side of
Lane End
and has Holy
Trinity
Church at its
centre. The
Common is
regularly
used by

villagers for leisure activities such as dog-walking and is the site of Lane End's annual fete

The Common was put up for sale in April of this year with an asking price of £75,000 as part of the estate of the late Thomas Taylor, a London solicitor. Lane End Parish Council called an Extraordinary Parish Council Meeting to discuss the issue. The meeting was very

well-attended and passions ran high, with villagers stressing the historic importance of the Common at the heart of the local community as a haven of green space for wildlife, walking and recreation.

The local strength of feeling about

the Common, coupled with immediate pledges of financial assistance persuaded the Parish Council to seek to purchase the land.

Lane End Parish Council is contributing £30,000 from its own reserves, has received substantial grants

and donations from bodies such as the Chiltern Conservation Board and Lane End Conference Centre, and is seeking to raise a further £21,000 through contributions from parishioners and fund-raising activities. On the land

MP visits local farms

I was asked this morning how the harvest work is progressing, and what effect the early heat-wave and lack of rain in the Spring has had on the yield on our wheat crops. The answer is that the excessive rain in June was a real benefit to the cereal

crops, even though it caused immense difficulty to livestock farmers attempting to make silage or hay at that time

In the three months of March. April and May total rainfall was only 91mm so we were

expecting the crops to ripen too early with very poor yields. But then rain in June was 98mm, similar rainfall to a wet winter month, which came just in time for the wheat to resume growth. We started harvest on 28 July, only a few days earlier than usual, and yields so far have averaged at about 3 tonnes per acre. This is slightly less than most vears, but still satisfactory, whereas in the eastern counties such as Kent the June rainfall came too late to improve those crops which had suffered from the early season drought.

The farm's gross sales from the arable fields depend as much on market value of grain as on the yield

> per acre. And market value is not controlled locally. since wheat is an international commodity. It can be shipped at fairly low cost from one country to another. and so wheat vields in America or Russia will be

just as important as yields in South Bucks when the

world's grain traders balance the likely world stocks against anticipated worldwide demand. And worldwide demand will include wheat that is distilled to make bioethanol as a source of energy, as well as wheat used by the human race for bread, biscuits and breakfast cereals and also wheat used to make livestock feeds for pigs, poultry and cattle.



There are then further difficulties with this international commodity trade in that some poor countries have insufficient funds to buy enough grain to avoid its peoples starving, and at the other end of the scale some grain trading companies, such as Cargill and Associated British Foods in developed countries have become so large that they can

now manipulate the market to their shareholders' advantage.

On the farm we have to accept the going rate for the grain, most of which we sell through a farmers' cooperative called Openfield. For the year 2009/10 world-

wide consumption of wheat was more than estimated production, so worldwide reserves were depleted.

Thus the market reacted to this shortage between demand and supply with an increase in the worldwide market value. This was good news for those of us who grow wheat, but bad news for farmers who have to buy feeding stuffs for their livestock. For the household budget there should be no further increase in the price of bread, since the ingredient cost of farm-grown wheat is only a small proportion of the retail cost of a loaf of bread, generally between 12% and 25% dependent on brand, and shop

prices have already increased in recent months to take account of this higher market value of wheat.

Will Lacey writes on p25 about the real menace and danger to the health of cattle from 'Chinese Lanterns' which have landed on pasture fields. Farmers hope that these Chinese Lanterns will be made illegal, since they are a fire risk to ripe

cereal crops and to buildings as well as causing the death of cattle. Our Member of Parliament. Steve Baker. visited Lacevs Family Farm in June (see photo) where we were able to discuss with him the need

for better contracts and prices for milk producers and the need to control badgers infected with tuberculosis as well as our hope that Chinese Lanterns will be made illegal.

Anti-Social Behaviour

Mini motos—There has been an increase in calls reporting the anti social use of miniature motorbikes (mini Motos), quad bikes and off road motorcycles (MBs) again in Lane End. We will be targeting this problem over the next month.

MB users are often confused about where they are lawfully entitled to ride and wrongfully assume that they can ride them on roads or footpaths, common land, woodland or recreational parks. The only place they can be ridden is on privately owned land where the permission of the land owner has been given and where the general public do not have access, or at an authorised race or off road track/course. The nearest location for off-road bikes is on Daws Hill Lane, Flackwell Heath, which is run by Z-Racing.

If MBs are used at unauthorised locations then the rider could face prosecution or the MB could be seized by the police if the rider has been previously issued with a warning.

The police urge anyone who may own or is looking to purchase a MB that they conduct thorough research about the relevant laws, legislation and where MBs can be lawfully used. This approach will hopefully reduce ASB complaints and prevent you from being prosecuted.

Neighbourhood priorities

Speeding:

PCSO Seston and PCSO Ling have been utilising the Speed Indication Device (SID) to provide a visible presence and speed deterrent within the community.

Partnership Activity:

Neighbour disputes—often petty matters become blown out of all proportion and lead to unnecessary conflict and an irreparable breakdown of neighbourly relationships.

Avoid potential conflict with the following tips:

Building work – Are you planning building work? If yes then consider keeping your neighbours informed of your schedule. Include information about deliveries, how long a skip will be in place, how contact can be made with you if a neighbour has any concerns, etc.

This approach may help to you prevent any disruption being caused to your neighbours daily activities and to their peace and quiet.

Fence or Boundary Disputes – speak with your neighbour before taking any action. The next step is to seek the advice of a chartered surveyor or a solicitor. Boundary disputes are not a police matter and will have to be sorted out via the civil court.

Question I'm getting a bad smell from the en-suite bathroom in the guest bedroom. It's hardly ever used but it's very embarrassing when visitors do stay with us. What can I do?

Answer It sounds like you're suffering from a loss of 'trap seal'.

The U-bends under the sink and bath aren't just there to make nice gurgling noises – the water in the U-bend is there to stop sewer gases coming back up the pipe and into the room. When the weather is hot or if the bathroom is left unused for long periods then the water in the trap can evaporate, allowing bad odours back into the room.

The cure is simply to run a small amount of water into the sink, bath and shower every couple of weeks to keep the traps intact and you'll have a lovely, sweet-smelling bathroom once again.

Gardening

Keep your garden looking good in Autumn

The hottest part of our summer should be drifting away, (if we had one) but there are still more colourful delights left in the garden to take us through into autumn.

Seasonal Top Tips:

The grass cutting should be slowing down now, and come the autumn the garden centres will be supplying bags of lawn feed that is different from the spring feed. The difference is that it contains very low amounts of Nitrogen, and as we know, Nitrogen promotes leaf growth which is not wanted this time of year. So, don't use your spring feed in the autumn! The autumn feed also contains high levels of Phosphorus and Potash, which is good for building strong roots and healthy plants, thus preparing them for the winter, so all in all a good idea.

Autumn is a very good time for dividing herbaceous perennials, and there are two good reasons for this. Firstly if plants have become too dense and are outgrowing their space they can be dug up, split up and the smaller plants re-planted.

Secondly, the rest of the plant can be used to increase stock and be planted in other areas of the garden. It is sometimes nice to have the same plants repeated in two or three area as when they flower your eves are drawn consecutively from one to the next as it provides continuity throughout the garden.

Favourites:

Something for the rock garden or front of a border or even naturalised in grass for this time of year is the Autumn Crocus. Don't get this mixed up with the Spring flowering Crocus (Iris family). This species is known as Colchicum autumnale, and actually belongs to another family altogether, the Lily family, and will flower in autumn. That should confuse the neighbours!



Another good late flowerer is a shrub also with blue flowers that will give a real show, called the hardy Plumbago. (Ceratostigma willmottianum). The flowers are small but the abundance of them make up for it. The shrub itself only grows from 2-4ft high, but beware, although this is called a 'Hardy' Plumbago, in cold winters the stems get knocked back with the frost. So after this happens cut the stems hard back and the plant re-grows from the bottom.



Dave's Mystery Plant:

I am a deciduous midsized bush that is usually found growing quite small and unshapely in a number of peoples gardens. I do need a bit of protection from the cold winter so like being beside a house or wall, or I may lose a few branches.

What gives me away is that after my leaves have turned red and dropped, I produce clusters of little violet/purple polished berries that look like small pearls.

What's my name?

Answer: Beauty Berry. (Callicarpa giraldii 'Profusion')
